


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

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STAFFING

The Taylorville Police Department is committed to providing the best service possible with prudent spending. To achieve this goal an annual resource allocation study by division is completed. This allocation study helps to identify proper staffing levels per shift. For 2023 the City population is estimated at 10,284 people. Our authorized sworn personnel strength is 19 Police Officers with a Deputy Chief and Chief. To help facilitate quality service, we should be at 22. We have one records clerk and five full time dispatchers and one part time dispatcher.

The coordination of training for the Taylorville Police Department is the responsibility of the Chief and Lt. Toberman. Training programs are presented through classroom instruction, printed materials, videos, online instruction, seminars, and departmental communications. Training topics have included: policy and procedure review, criminal law, local ordinances, and traffic law updates.



Field Operations: Patrol Division

The Patrol Division is the largest and most highly visible component of the Taylorville Police Department. Employing 4 sergeants and 12 patrol officers, the primary responsibility of the Patrol Division is the protection of life and property. Patrol officers maintain peace and order, conduct preliminary investigations, and enforce traffic and criminal laws, as well as City ordinances. Patrol officers provide initial response to emergency and non-emergency calls for service. They handle special assignments, proactively address community concerns, and perform ancillary functions.

INVESTIGATION UNIT: DET. ADAMS & DET. WOOD

The Criminal Investigations Division provides the City of Taylorville with professional and skilled investigators who are available twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. Not only does this division handle all criminal investigations and interrogations, personnel background checks, The Criminal Investigations Division is responsible for all follow up investigations and reviewing details of crimes occurring in the City

Officer Grove's duties are to ensure that narcotics are sent to the Illinois State
Police Crime Lab. Her duties are also to pick up the narcotics and make sure the chain of command is in compliance.
Officer Grove also handle's several other types of evidence to electronically post and store for evidence services.







FOIA REQUESTS: APPROXIMATELY 425 IN 2023.

The Records Section is responsible for managing all of the records for the Police Department as well as monthly reporting for the Uniform Crime Report. The City of Taylorville records clerk handles all police reports to be turned into the States Attorney. Kirsten goes above and beyond to keep our department running efficiently with the States Attorney's Office. Kirsten must make sure all bills are paid and accounted for. Kirsten, along with the Chief, watch our budget monthly to make sure we are on track of our allocation amount.

The Communications Section is responsible for receiving all emergency and non-emergency calls for police, this section handles the dispatching of all calls for service for police through the use of the department's radio system.

We are currently staffed with five full time dispatchers and one part time dispatcher. Dispatch plays a vital role for the City Police Department. Besides handling calls for service they must run subjects for warrants, driver licenses check, monitor the FLOCK LPR system, and properly log all aspects of each call and encounter that the police officer has with a citizen.

We have a great team and our team leader is Andrew Borders.

The anticipated CAD system came into effect in June of 2022, combining systems with Christian County Sheriff's Office and other agencies within the county making it easier for departments to share information and help officer investigations.



Officers as well as the Explorers shopped with families, smiles were all around!







Bike Rodeo

COMMUNITY ACTION/EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAMS

- TPD is extremely happy to partner with Assumption Police, Stonington Police, Morrisonville Police, Kincaid Police and Edinburg Police to fight the war on drugs. Since the inception of this team, we have all seen a decrease in crime and more narcotic investigations. The ERT team consists of members of the majority of the departments. The team members are swat trained and also train monthly. We are extremely lucky to have this team in our county. The team helps our CAT team conduct search warrants and assist on ground searches if needed.
- The Community Action Team has conducted several narcotic investigations throughout the year in Taylorville, Kincaid, Assumption and Stonington. This had led to several arrests along with search warrants. The partnership has grown in 2023 and we expect 2024 to be even a better year. The CAT team thanks all the citizens that have helped us in 2023.



CANINE (K9) DIVISION

The K9 Division is led by Officer Rachel Priddy and K9 Alan



A K9s keen sense of smell helps them to detect items that a human officer might miss, especially drugs and bombs. With training, K9s can even sniff out drugs that are sealed in plastic.

K9s can also be used to search for flammables and explosives. And a positive indication from a K9 is legal grounds to establish probable cause for a search.

K9s are frequently used to track missing people in search-and-rescue missions. Once a dog is given a piece of an item with the scent of a specific person, they can lead the police down the path that person took. This is also useful when tracking down suspects or escaped convicts. K9s can quickly lead teams down the right way. During a pursuit or search and rescue mission, every minute counts, so having this extra knowledge is invaluable.



OUR GOALS FOR 2023

Looking forward into 2023 we are excited about our community engagements and continued efforts to keep the community safe from drugs and crime.

The year 2022 was a year of great change and momentum for the Taylorville Police Department. As we move into 2023, the staff at the police department is excited about the boundless new opportunities that we have been presented to continue to recognize the Taylorville Police Department as a premier police department using innovative and progressive policing strategies resulting in a safe community.

In 2023 the citizens of Taylorville will also be hearing about the possibility of a new justice center. This is an extensive, exciting project that involves the cooperation of many city departments.
