Chairman Brown called the meeting to order at 6:00 P.M.

FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT

- Calls for 2021 are up from calls in 2020
- Department has been doing training in a number of different areas
- Volunteer Colin Ayers completed BOF class and will be certified this year through the State
- New Hire Dillon Goldsmith will start January 17, 2022
- Captain Ron Smith's official last day with TFD is January 9, 2022
- Angel Tree was able to help 160 children have a great Christmas, also helped Mother with a special needs child
- Hosted Blood Drive/Pub Ed-extrication class for LLCC, installed car seats and smoke alarm
- District decided to go ahead with purchase of Tanker
- TFD had calls for 2 cardiac saves within two hours and a grain bin rescue

Captain Cody Rogers, Firefighter Zepin, and Firefighter Wamsley assisted as mutual aid to the Midland Fire Protection District for a residential home fire. All three of the firefighters who responded to the call worked over and above what is normally expected of a TFD member at a routine call. Their actions will be honored at a future date.

PURCHASE OF ADDITIONAL K-9 UNIT

Chief Wheeler advised the Committee that not much has changed since the last discussion about the purchase of the additional K-9 unit. Schools for K-9 training are hard to get into right now. Cane County has a K-9 training school available at a cost of \$2,000.00 for a six-week training course. Chief Wheeler had previously asked for \$12,000.00 to cover the cost of dog training, equipping a vehicle and a hotel stay for the officer during K-9 training. Chief Wheeler is now asking for \$14,000.00 to cover costs due to prices going up. There was discussion about funds to cover costs, to possibly come from cannabis tax. Treasurer Hamell advised she looked into using money from cannabis tax and it is unclear if it can or cannot be used for a K-9.

POLICE CHIEF'S REPORT

Chief Wheeler is working on the annual report, and advised the Committee that he will send a pdf file to all Alderman with the completed report when he is finished. Chief Wheeler discussed a few highlights of the upcoming annual report with the Committee, and gave updates on calls for service, employees and engagement with the community. He also touched on the subject of getting the officer hiring lists updated with potential candidates for future hires. At this time there are only two names on the list. One of the candidates has informed the department of an out of state move in a few months and the other previously failed the psych test.


ANY OTHER MATTERS

Alderman Budd would like to see police presence in the area to help prevent

accidents or possible injuries to children. Chief Wheeler stated that he has noticed congestion in that area. He stated that he would like to set up a sting operation in that area to see about getting the issue under control. Alderman Olive would like to see solar sign with lights in the area.

SALE OF SCBA

Fire Chief Adermann advised the department has used SCBA to sale. There are approximately 25 packs and 30 bottles. Chief Adermann explained the inability to put an exact dollar amount on the equipment as it will depend on what buyers are willing to spend. After discussion the decision was made for Chief Adermann to gather exact equipment quantities, estimated values and send to the Ordinance Committee as an ordinance will need to be created for the sale of property.

END OF YEAR REPORT

Chief Adermann advised he sent the report to the Mayor and Aldermen. Alderman Skultety stated there was no need to go through the report item by item as everyone has a copy. Chief Adermann discussed a few key items and advised if there are any questions to contact him.

E- CITATIONS

Police Chief Wheeler discussed the move to E-Citations county wide. This program is in the beginning stages with an estimated Go Live date is fall of 2022. The county board has approved the use of ARPA funds to purchase the program and cover the maintenance fees until approximately fall of 2024. After this the yearly maintenance fee will be \$235.00 per unit/license.

PURCHASE OF RIFLES FOR EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM

Police Chief Wheeler requests to purchase rifles for the ERT. The officers are still discussing which rifles will be purchased and at what price. Chief Wheeler advised the department received a grant to assist with the purchase. There was discussion regarding the current budget of the department. Alderman Budd recommended Chief delay the purchase of the rifles at this time and include it into next year's budget. There was further discussion on how to better incorporate grant funds and expenditures into the department's budget moving forward.

IDPH GRANT PURCHASES

FUNDING

Boards members have approached him regarding a donation to Safe Passage. He also believes the grant currently funding the payroll for Safe Passage coordinators will be extended.

UPDATE ON FIELD TRAINING OFFICER

Police Chief Wheeler stated both new recruits are doing well and will be on their own in two weeks.

POLICE VEHICLES FOR SALE BY MISSOURI STATE HIGHWAY PATROL

Police Chief Wheeler explained Missouri State Highway Patrol replaces their vehicles at the 50,000-mile mark and sell at a low cost to other agencies. There is a long waiting list at this time.

GRANT FOR NEW VEHICLE

Police Chief Wheeler was advised by USDA that the department was eligible to apply for a third grant for the purchase of a new vehicle. He will be submitting the grant in the next couple weeks.



PURCHASE OF BALLISTIC VESTS

Fire Chief Adermann discussed the need to purchase Ballistic Vests.

Motion by Alderman Skultety and seconded by Alderman Olive to recommend to the City Council to approve the Fire Department to purchase seven (7) Ballistic Vests from RMA Armament, Inc. at a cost not to exceed \$2,495.68, with 50% of the payment to be reimbursed to the City by the Hero Fund Grant. HYPER-REACH MASS NOTIFICATION

Hyper-Reach is a mass notification service that is used to get information out to the community via call, text or email. The City can use this program to send out emergency notifications as well as road construction, boil orders, events etc. When set up by the individual, they will choose what type of notifications they would like to receive. The cost for a one-year contract is \$5,450.00.

Motion by Alderman Skultety and seconded by Alderman Olive to recommend to the City Council to approve the Fire Department to purchase Hyper-Reach for a one-year contract the cost at a cost not to exceed \$5,450.00, to be paid for from the ESDA Budget. The motion carried (3-0).

EMERGENCY OPERATION CENTER UPGRADE

Fire Chief Adermann explained the Emergency Operations Center for both City and Christian County is headquartered at the Taylorville Fire Department. The current computer system that is utilized is from 2007. This system is now obsolete. Chief Adermann presented a quote from Computer Techniques in the amount of \$12,094.59 for a Dell 86" touch monitor and a 4K camera and speakerphone. The cost will be split with Christian County Emergency Management.

Motion by Alderman Skultety and seconded by Alderman Olive to recommend to the City Council to approve Taylorville Fire Department to purchase a Dell 86" touch monitor and a 4K camera and speakerphone from Computer Techniques at a cost not to exceed \$12,094.59, with the City of Taylorville to pay \$6,047.29 from the ESDA Budget and the remaining \$6,047.30 to be paid by Christian County Emergency Management. The motion carried (3-0).



VEHICLE REPLACEMENT

Fire Chief Adermann discussed the need to replace the Expedition and Brush Truck as part of the Capital Management Plan. He explained there are no replacements available at this time for the Brush Truck. The Committee was provided with a quote from Bob Ridings for a 2023 Dodge Durango for \$44,138.00; a quote for the Equipment Cabinet for rear from 1st In Emergency Products for \$4,687.50; and was advised the estimated cost to equip the vehicle with Warning Lights and Sirens is \$3,000.00.

Motion by Alderman Driskell and seconded by Alderman Skultety to recommend to the City Council to approve the Fire Department to purchase a 2023 Dodge Durango from Bob Ridings at a cost of \$44,138.00; to purchase the Equipment Cabinet for rear from 1st In Emergency Products at a cost of \$4,687.50, and to equip the vehicle with Warning Lights and Sirens at a cost of \$3,000.00, for a total cost not to exceed \$51,825.50, to be paid from the Equipment Line item in the FY 2022/2023 Budget.


ANY OTHER MATTERS
