Chairman Walters called the meeting to order at 6:00 P.M.

SPECIAL EVENT REQUEST-RONALD MCDONALD HOUSE

Motion by Alderman Vota and seconded by Alderman Olive to recommend to the City Council to approve the Special Event Request for McDonalds for the Ronald McDonald Charity at the corner of Webster and Main Cross on Saturday, February 9, 2019 from 8:00 A.M to 12:00 P.M. Motion carried 3-0

DOWNTOWN TAYLORVILLE.ORG CALENDAR OF EVENTS

Motion by Alderman Olive and seconded by Alderman Vota to recommend to the City Council to approve the 2019 Calendar of Events for Downtown Taylorville.org which includes:

Farmers Market Saturday mornings late April thru October, Thursday meals May 16th, June 20th, September 19th and October 17th, Summertime on the Square June 8th, Meet the Machines September 7th, Dog Days September 14th, and the Twilight Christmas Parade December 7th. Motion carried 3-0.

TREE DEBRIS REMOVAL-WACO STREET

Mike Lawrence and his son Brandon Lawrence, who owns a house on Waco Street, were present to discuss an issue regarding logs being removed from Brandon's back yard after the tornado. Mike Lawrence stated he had called the City and advised them he had a crew of men that did work on his sons' yard and asked that the logs remain on the property. When he returned to the property the logs had been removed. He contacted the City to ask where the logs would have been taken, he was advised all the lumber was taken to a burn pile.

The Committee asked if the lumber was marked not to take; Mr. Lawrence advised it was not marked, but it was in his sons back yard on private property. He was told the debris in the back yard would not be picked up. A neighbor told him he witnessed the City pick it up.

Mr. Lawrence advised the Committee they had a buyer for the wood; it was walnut which is an expensive lumber. The money was going to be used to pay his sons deductible, help pay for some of the repairs and to replace his belongings.

The Committee advised they were sorry that this happened; it was a miscommunication. Some members of the Council in attendance stated the City Employees were doing their job, and wanted to thank them as well as all employees of the Townships, County and Volunteers for doing a great job.

Mr. Lawrence had nothing in writing from the company stating how much they were going to pay; he was advised to get in writing from the company what they had offered to pay and present it to the City Clerk who would forward to the City's insurance carrier to see if there would be any type of coverage.

SEEK BIDS FOR TRASH REMOVAL THROUGHOUT THE CITY

Motion by Alderman Vota and seconded by Alderman Olive to recommend to the City Council to allow Superintendent Wiseman to seek bids for trash removal throughout the City. Motion carried 3-0.

REQUEST "NO PARKING" SIGN ON THE SOUTH SIDE OF 400 BLOCK OF WEST POPLAR

Mr. Pat Kretzer recently purchased a home in the 400 block of West Poplar he stated the houses in this area do not have driveways. The street is narrow and it will be hard to back out of if there is a car parked on the street behind the proposed driveway. One of his concerns is in case of an emergency the fire engine would not be able to make it down the street with cars parked on both sides of the street.

The Committee advised him they have had requests for "No Parking" before for similar situations that were denied as the neighbors have no where else to park. Mr. Kretzer was advised they would research the City Code for offside parking in his area. This will remain an agenda item on next months agenda.

STORM DRAIN ON THE NORTHEAST END

There was discussion regarding the storm drain on the Northeast End. The work that has been completed by Seventh Son Excavating was taken from Ward I funds. Alderman Budd and Alderman Olive voiced concerns with the amount that was taken out of their funds as they were in favor of covering some of the expense but thought the amount was going to be considerably less. Street and Sewer Superintendent Wiseman suggested using funds from the fifth special fund that was established to cover emergency expenses. The Committee agreed the cost of the storm drain should be divided with the other entities that are benefitting as well. Mayor Barry plans to discuss this with the other entities and possibly divide the cost five ways. This will be forwarded to next months agenda.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

- Superintendent Wiseman gave a brief overview of the work that has been done the last month concerning the tornado damages and the heavy snowfall.
- Demolished a house on Cleveland and filled in a basement of a house on Cheney.
- Southern Baptist is coming back to help cut down trees

ANY OTHER MATTERS

Billie Heberling, County Highway Department, is working with the City to keep track of the expenses associated with the tornado cleanup. She presented a work sheet outlining the dates, the time employees worked during regular work hours and overtime hours which includes benefit rates and the cost of elected/appointed officials rates. She also presented equipment costs and the cost of materials.

Chairman Walters called the meeting to order at 6:00 P.M.

TREE DEBRIS REMOVAL-WACO STREET

Mike Lawrence and his son Brandon Lawrence, who owns a house on Waco Street, were present at the January Street & Sewer Committee Meeting. He had called the City to advise he had a crew of men that did work on his sons' yard and asked that the logs remain on the property. They were removed. He had a buyer for the wood, the money was going to be used to pay his sons deductible, help pay for some of the repairs and to replace his belongings. He did not have any paperwork that meeting. He was advised to bring the paperwork with the name of buyer and amount he was to be paid. He has since provided the information, Mr. Lawrence was told the City's insurance agent advised it should be submitted to the homeowner's insurance carrier. Mr. Lawrence contacted his insurance company and they advised him the City is responsible as they removed the lumber from the premises. After a lengthy discussion, the following motion was made.

Motion by Alderman Vota to recommend to the City Council that the City and the Homeowner split the cost 50/50, the motion died for lack of a second. After discussion the Committee agreed this issue should be handled between the two insurance carriers.

REQUEST FOR A "YIELD SIGN" FOR MADISON TO YIELD TO VINE

Chairman Walters advised there is an Ordinance in place for a "Yield Sign" at this location and directed Street and Sewer Superintendent to have a sign placed at this location.

REQUEST "NO PARKING" SIGN ON THE SOUTH SIDE OF 400 BLOCK OF WEST POPLAR

Mr. Pat Kretzer was present to request a "NO PARKING" sign on the South side of the 400 block of West Poplar. Mr. Kretzer provided maps showing the area, stating it is a safety issue as the road is very narrow. With cars parked on both sides of the street, there is no way the fire truck could clear the vehicles. The Committee and Aldermen in attendance agreed that it is a safety issue.

Motion by Alderman Olive and seconded by Alderman Vota to recommend to the City Council to direct the City Attorney to prepare an Ordinance for a "NO PARKING" sign for the South Side of the 400 Block of West Poplar. Motion carried 3-0.

STORM SEWER FOR CENTRAL AVENUE

Mr. John Crist was in attendance to discuss the storm sewer for Central Avenue. This issue has been discussed at previous meetings. He advised the water is still causing damage to the church as it is coming into the building. When there is a minimum amount of rain, the water backs up behind the door where they keep the mowers and equipment. When there is a heavy rain, the whole parking lot is flooded. Superintendent Wiseman advised the work needs to be done as the City has already ran a 30' line when there were problems along White Line. It would not take a lot to run the line to the church. Mr. Crist stated he would do the trenching himself to cut the costs. Superintendent Wiseman had gotten quotes from Malby Excavating for the work which was approximately \$13,000.00, but that was a year ago. He will contact them to see what the cost would be now. He recommends that the City have Malby Excavating do all the work.

The Committee agreed the work should be done. There was a recommendation that the funds come from the 5th account that was created. Alderman Burtle agreed the work should be done but the 5th account was funds set aside from the other Ward funds for emergencies, this is not an emergency. It has been an ongoing problem and will only get worse when the spring rains. The Committee agreed the work needs to be done and recommend that the funds come from Ward funds. Alderman Dorchinecz is the Alderman for Ward III and was not present this evening, Alderman Jones which is the other Alderman for Ward III recently retired. Mayor Barry advised Mr. Crist he would discuss this with Alderman Dorchinecz after Superintendent Wiseman gets the new quotes, and if in agreement to proceed with the storm sewer, it would be placed on the March 18th 2019 City Council Agenda.

SPECIAL EVENT REQUEST-WALK A MILE IN HER SHOES MARCH/RALLY

Erin Domonousky and Jody Clark, representing Prairie Center Against Sexual Assault was in attendance for a Special Event Request for Walk A Mile in Her Shoes March/Rally. The March/Rally will be April 20, 2019 from 9:00 A.M to 1:00 P.M starting at 215 W. Main Cross. They will proceed East to the Square and walk two laps around the square and end in front of the Court House. They asked that the roads be blocked as they will be walking in the street.

The guest speakers are going to be set up on the Courthouse yard; they were advised they would have to get approval from the County as the grounds is County property. Mayor Barry advised them to check on the date and time of the Little League Parade as it is usually held at this time and to check with Marcia Neal, Downtown Taylorville.org for the schedule for Farmers Market. Mayor Barry advised if there is no problem with scheduling, he would have this issue forwarded to the March 18th City Council Agenda.

SUMMER SEASONAL HELP REQUESTS

There was discussion regarding the finances of the City. The issue of Summer Seasonal Help was forwarded to the Personnel Committee.

There were some suggestions to change the contract for concrete work; it was recommended that the residents pay upfront before the job is started.

Motion by Alderman Olive and seconded by Alderman Vota to recommend to the City Council to allow Superintendent Wiseman to seek bids for Fuel, Sidewalk, Curbs & Gutter and Concrete. Motion carried 3-0.

PERMISSION TO SCRAP THE FOLLOWING: 98 CHEVY 1/2 TON PICK-UP, 98 CHEVY 3/4 TON 4X4 AND 93 CHEVY 1/2 TON PICK-UP

Motion by Alderman Vota and seconded by Alderman Olive to recommend to the City Council to direct the City Attorney to prepare an Ordinance to sell the 98 Chevy 1/2 ton pick-up, 98 Chevy 3/4 ton 4X4 and the 93 Chevy 1/2 ton pick-up with a \$300.00 minimum bid on each. Motion carried 3-0.

He also advised there was a broken sewer tap on Haner Ave. The resident will pay half and the City will pay half which is \$1,500.00. He also advised a blower went out on a backhoe; the cost of repairs was approximately \$2,000.00.

Mayor Barry and Alderman Larry Budd will be guest speakers at the Rural Community Economic Development Conference being held in Springfield on March 7, 2019.

Mayor Barry advised there is a group of volunteers coming next week to canvas the area to see what work needs to be done. There are other groups returning as well when weather permits. The Correctional Center has offered help again also.

Billie Heberling, employee of the County working with the City on paperwork for a grant, presented updated figures of the County and City Employees and Elected Officials salaries and labor, to date the amount is \$370,063.48. Mayor Barry advised Governor J.B. Pritzker and Congressman Davis have both been in contact with him.

Motion by Alderman Vota and seconded by Alderman Olive to adjourn. Motion carried 3-0. Meeting adjourned at 7:53P.M.

**CONSIDERATION OF USE OF FUNDS FROM THE COMMON STREET
MAINTENANCE ACCOUNT**

Chairman Walters advised Alderman Dorchinecz is requesting that the funds to repair the storm sewer for Central Avenue which has been discussed at previous meetings be split equally by using half from Ward III funds and half from the Common Street Maintenance Account.

Superintendent Wiseman advised he contacted Maltby their cost to do the trench work is \$6,600.00 or \$13,783.00 if they provide materials. Superintendent Wiseman advised the City can purchase the pipe for \$4,367.00. If no change in price before project is completed the total cost of the project would be \$10,967.00.

The Committee was asked where the problem was located. Mr. John Crist has attended meetings in the past with concerns regarding flooding of the parking lot at the church and water has come into the building causing damage.

The City has an Ordinance for the Common Street Maintenance Account which outlines any time funds used from this account it must be approved by the City Council.

Motion by Alderman Dorchinecz and seconded by Alderman Olive to recommend to the City Council to approve the cost not to exceed \$5,500.00 from the Common Street Maintenance Account for the Central Avenue Storm Sewer. Motion carried 4-0.

Patti Hornbuckle was in attendance requesting a Special Event Permit for the Chamber of Commerce for a Community Blood Drive. She asked to amend the time, from 10:30 A.M. to 10:00 A.M. on Friday, May 17, 2019 and Friday, August 23, 2019 from 10:00 A.M to 2:30 P.M. to be held on the South East Side of the Square. They will need approximately 30 minutes before and after for set up and clean up.

She is requesting the use of approximately 6-8 inside parking spaces. The Central Illinois Community Blood Center's mobile bank would arrive at 10:00 A.M. and leave at approximately 3:00 P.M. on both dates. She was advised the area would have to be closed off. Superintendent Wiseman will drop off the cones to her ahead of time to place and they will be responsible for picking them up.

DINNER SEASONED WITH LOVE-SPECIAL EVENT PERMIT

Suzy Traughber and Christine Garza were present to request a Special Event Permit for “Dinner Seasoned with Love” a first-ever Community Table in Taylorville. The Community Table is a single, long line of tables that is designed to have the Community come together share a free warm meal and visit. There will also be games for the children. DSWL has been serving free dinners for 13 years. They are requesting to set up on the street and parking lot on the South Side of the Square on Saturday, June 15, 2019. If there was going to be anything set up on the courthouse lawn, they would have to get permission from the County. Mrs. Traughber advised there would be port-a-potties and hand washing stations set up.

The meal will be served from 11:30 A.M. until 12:30 P.M but with preparation and clean up are requesting to block off the area from 8:00 A.M until 5:00 P.M. The menu is not complete yet but there will be hamburgers and hot dogs cooked on a grill with chips and baked beans being placed on each table. Chairman Walters advised them to contact the merchants and Marcia Neal as the Farmers Market will be set up also. Superintendent Wiseman advised he would provide the barricades but it would be up to them to set up and take down. They will be blocking Washington Street and South Main. Chairman Walters asked about a rain date; if it rains it would be moved to Calvary Baptist Church. Mrs. Hornbuckle suggested that they consider asking for sponsors that could help serve.

Motion by Alderman Vota and seconded by Alderman Olive to recommend to the City Council to approve the request for the “Dinner Seasoned with Love” Special Event Permit to be held on the South Side of the Square on Saturday, June 15, 2019 from 11:30 A.M until 12:30 P.M. DRAINAGE TILE PROJECT REIMBURSEMENT

There was discussion regarding the drainage tile project (storm drain on the Northeast end) which is in the Drainage District. The City and Township had agreed to help with assistance. Alderman Budd the cost of the project to Ward I was to be \$8,000.00, but the City received the bill for the project in the amount of \$61,000.00 which was paid for out of Ward I funds. Alderman Olive advised originally the estimate was \$46,000.00 with the City doing the digging and the Township providing an employee. Alderman Budd stated this bill is not the City’s and the funds need to be reimbursed. They need to have a meeting with all parties involved to get this resolved. It was suggested that Ahlstrom be contacted. Superintendent Wiseman advised the project benefits the whole City.

SEEK BIDS FOR MILLING AND ASHALT FOR EAST MAIN CROSS FROM PAW PAW TO CHEROKEE STREET AND CURB, SIDEWALK AND PAVEMENT FOR THE INTERSECTION OF PLEASANT AND WALNUT STREET.

Chairman Walters advised the ad to seek bids for the Milling and Asphalt for East Main Cross from Paw Paw to Cherokee Street and Curb, Sidewalk and Pavement for the Intersection of Pleasant and Walnut Street has already been put in the paper. Bids will be open on May 3, 2019 and placed on the May 6, 2019 City Council Agenda.

Superintendent Wiseman discussed the construction work being completed at Taylorville Memorial Hospital; they are going to be putting in a catch basin. Chairman Walters presented everyone with a map outlining the projects which need to be completed in the area.

Superintendent Wiseman advised the construction has affected the depths of the concrete pavement and curbs and all the new will have to meet ADA Standards. He is recommending that all Wards contribute to this project as Walnut Street has been a City Project.

“NO PARKING ON SOUTH SIDE OF ESTHER & REMOVE TWO “NO PARKING” SIGNS BETWEEN WEBSTER STREET AND NORTH WASHINGTON

There was discussion regarding moving the “No Parking” Sign on the South Side of Esther Street located across from Eric Kahle/State Farm Insurance Office and to remove the two “No Parking” Signs between Webster Street and North Washington.

Motion by Alderman Vota and seconded by Alderman Olive to recommend to the City Council to direct City Attorney Romano to draft an Ordinance to rescind the Ordinance for the “No Parking” sign on the South Side of Esther in the 300 Block and remove two “No Parking” signs between Webster Street and North Washington Street. Motion carried 3-0.

SUPERINTENDENT’S REPORT

The Department has been busy picking up brush piles and running the chipper in all four Wards, finished the storm sewer at Northern Avenue. Helped get the main line in at Steak N Shake, and helped them with hauling of rock which they paid for.

Fuhrmann had to make some revisions with the State for the turn lane off of Northern Ave.

ANY OTHER MATTERS

Mayor Barry encouraged all Aldermen in attendance to help with the City Clean Up at the Street Department Saturday, April 27, 2019 from 7:00 A.M. to 3:00 P.M.

Alderman Budd stated he would like to help the owner of the Kona Ice Truck get started rather than making her wait another month. Chairman Walters advised Alderman Budd to have her complete the Special Event Application and provide a Certificate of Insurance. If she completes the application and can get her Certificate of Insurance, this issue could be placed on the May 6, 2019 City Council Agenda.

Superintendent Wiseman discussed a couple of sewer projects he has been contacted about, one is RP Lumber; they are annexed into the City. The Committee asked him to ask other businesses in the area to see if any of them are interested and to check on Easements in that area.

SPECIAL EVENTS PERMIT - ANTIQUE CAR SHOW-SATURDAY, JUNE 29, 2019

Mr. Earl Walters presented information regarding the Antique Automobile Club of America and their antique car show which will be held at the Taylorville Square, on Saturday, June 29, 2019. They plan to arrive at 8:30 a.m. with 30 cars and will park on the inside of the West and North sides of the square. They will have lunch at Venezia with approximately 50 attendees. They plan to drive through the park and out to the Lake and will need police traffic control. Insurance and proper paperwork will be submitted.

Motion by Alderman Driskell and seconded by Alderman Dorchinecz to recommend to the City Council to approve the request and issue a Special Events Permit to the Antique Automobile Club of America for the antique car show to be held on Saturday June 29, 2019 beginning at 8:30 A.M. The motion carried (3-0).

KONA ICE TRUCK

Ms. Kim Smith and Mr. Gabriel Goodroe, owners of the Kona Ice truck, were present to introduce themselves and their business to the Committee. They have completed the appropriate paperwork and fee to obtain a permit from the Taylorville Police Department to operate in the City.

SPRAYING SOUTH END OF LAKE

Superintendent Wiseman discussed spraying at the South end of the Lake at County Road 8. This was done last year by Ferrill's Ag Management LLC. Superintendent Wiseman plans to utilize the same contractor. The cost will be \$5,640.00, with the cost to be split between the Street, Lake, and Water Departments, which is the same price as 2018 service.

Motion by Alderman Driskell and seconded by Alderman Dorchinecz to recommend to the City Council to allow Superintendent Wiseman to hire Ferrill's Ag Management LLC to spray the South end of Lake

Taylorville at County Road 8 at a cost not to exceed \$5,640.00, pending receipt of signed City's form contract and requisite proof of insurance. Motion carried 3-0.

NORTHERN AVENUE & RT. 29 TURN LANE

Superintendent Wiseman discussed the State of Illinois requirement that has been imposed upon the City to complete a right turn lane on Northern Avenue onto Route 29. This is based upon the Steak N Shake and is a result of the traffic study by Fuhrmann Engineering. This will be contracted out by the State of Illinois, but the City is responsible for payment of the project. The cost of the project is expected to be \$800,000.00 based on the estimate by Fuhrmann Engineering, and must be completed once approval is received from the State of Illinois,

Discussion was held regarding payment for this project and what funds would be available. Alderman Budd suggested asking the State for grant money. There will also be a road put in at the North end of the Morton property that is expected to cost \$875,000.00. Both projects were discussed in the past in relation to TIF Development projects. The use of Motor Fuel Tax Funds was also discussed, as there is approximately \$1 million that is in the Unobligated Balance that could potentially be utilized.

The City will be responsible for the project from the end of the concrete drive at Steak N Shake, where there is currently a rock drive, to Route 29. Alderman Olive suggested the City ask Furmann Engineering for the cost of only the concrete over the rock portion of the drive at this time as long as it would tie into the remainder of the project.

This issue will be continued to the June Committee meeting for further discussion.

WARD III PROJECTS 2019

Alderman Dorchinecz discussed a memo dated February 20, 2019 in which he had requested Ward III projects to be completed, along with projected start and completion dates. Of his list of four projects, two are currently approved and earmarked for completion: Central Street and the storm sewer on Morton Street. West Main Cross overlay is too costly to consider at this time. White Line Trucking at Airlawn and Central Avenue and the alley behind 1400 W. Franklin have issues to be added. Alderman Driskell was concerned with the prioritizing and planning for projects and was advised that lack of manpower and funding are the holdup for many projects.

This item will remain on future agendas for discussion.

there would need to be an easement for the sewer should the City decide to proceed. The Mayor has also been approached by an interested party regarding the purchase of property at 828 W. Vandever Street, which was recently given to the City. Alderman Budd noted that an appraisal must be done, and through a bid process, the City could accept an offer of no less than 80% of the appraised value.

Superintendent Wiseman stated that the Hunter Lift Station, located at Hunter and Poplar Street, may be located on property owned by Mr. Babe Assad, the railroad and another property owner. A title search was done by Advanced Title, and a survey done by Windell Surveying, both showing it to be on the property of Mr. Assad. Mr. Assad is requesting that the City put up a gate/fence around the Lift Station. As the Lift Station has been owned and operational by the City for 30 years, it was felt that this should be turned over to the City Attorney to investigate the legalities.

Motion by Alderman Driskell and seconded by Alderman Dorchinecz to adjourn. Motion carried 3-0.

Motion by Alderman Driskell and seconded by Alderman Skultety to recommend to the City Council to forward to the Ordinance Committee for approval of "No Parking Signs" located in the first three parking spaces of the 100 Block of Franklin Street West of South Main from the hours of 8:00 A.M- 3:00 P.M Monday-Friday in front of the Menta Academy Cornerstone Taylorville School. Motion carried 4-0.

2-WAY STOP SIGN-800 BLOCK OF NORTH SILVER/PAULINE

Steve Samson and Kevin Eson stated there are children in the 800 block of North Silver as well as handicapped residents in this area. There is a lot of traffic coming and going to the trailer park and apartments on Pauline Street. The biggest problem is between 3:30 P.M. and 6:00 P.M.

Alderman Olive drove by to check the location. Alderman Dorchinecz parked to observe the traffic and did not see any problems while he was there. Alderman Lanzotti parked in this area and observed cars traveling approximately 40-45 mph and one pickup probably going 45-50 mph to the trailer park. There was an elderly man walking along the road with a cane and they did not slow down going past him. Alderman Dorchinecz stated better to err to caution; Mayor Barry recommended to send to Ordinance.

Motion by Alderman Dorchinecz and seconded by Alderman Driskell to recommend to the City Council to forward to the Ordinance Committee for approval of a 2-way stop sign to be placed at the intersection of North Silver/Pauline. Motion carried 4-0.

SEWER PROJECTS- RICH STREET FROM HOUSTON TO ELEVATOR/ELEVATOR STREET FROM RICH TO ENGLAND/MORTON STREET FROM ADAMS STREET TO VANDEVEER STREET

City Engineer Joe Greene is preparing the work for the sewer projects on Rich Street from Houston to Elevator/Elevator Street from Rich to England/Morton Street from Adams Street to Vandever Street. The cost is estimated at \$250,000.00. Alderman Dorchinecz stated Ward III has major problems with drainage issues. He asked how this project was going to be paid for. The Committee advised to check with the City Engineer to confirm which areas are being addressed. Alderman Budd stated the documents for MFT funds have already been filed and approved with IDOT for Walnut Street. There has been discussion to use FAU Funds for West Main Cross. Alderman Budd advised if Alderman Dorchinecz and Alderman Bryant would agree to contribute \$100,000.00 from Ward III, he would approve of \$100,000.00 coming from the Non-Home Rule Excess Account. If other Wards would contribute, they could proceed. Alderman Skultety and Alderman Lanzotti

agreed to contribute up to \$50,000.00 from Ward II. Alderman Budd then advised if the project went over the \$250,000.00, the Non-Home Rule Excess Account would pay that amount also.

Motion by Alderman Skultety and seconded by Alderman Dorchinecz to recommend to the City Council to proceed with the sewer projects on Rich Street from Houston to Elevator/Elevator Street from Rich to England/Morton Street from Adams Street to Vandever Street with \$100,000.00 coming from Ward III, up to \$50,000.00 from Ward II and \$100,000.00 coming from the Non-Home Rule Excess Account; Non-Home Rule Excess Account will also pay any additional funds that exceed the \$250,000.00 Motion carried 4-0.

PLEASANT & WALNUT STREET FUNDING

Alderman Budd stated when the work on Pleasant and Walnut was being done by Truman Flatt, there was a hump in the road that had to be repaired at an additional cost of \$33,239.37. He requested the funds to come from the 5th Fund, but did not get approval. The funds came from Ward I to allow the project to proceed. Alderman Budd does not think the funds should come from Ward I and asked how it was going to be reimbursed. Alderman Lanzotti and Alderman Skultety agreed to pay half if Ward I would pay half.

Motion by Alderman Skultety and seconded by Alderman Driskell to recommend to the City Council to use \$16,619.69 from Ward I and \$16,619.68 from Ward II Funds for the Pleasant & Walnut Street Project. Motion carried 4-0.

Alderman Budd also advised Ward I paid \$89,622.75 towards the Webster Street Project; Ward I should be reimbursed from the money being transferred to the General Fund from the MFT refund.

ENGLAND STREET REPAIRS

No action taken; England Street will be included in the Sewer Projects discussed earlier.

PUMP UPGRADE FOR PRISON LIFT STATION

The Village of Edinburg purchased a new pump for one of their lift stations. The pump did not work properly due to their station not having check valves on the discharge lines. Vandevanter Engineering offered to sell this pump to the City of Taylorville for \$8,148.00, which is a 20% discount, to be used at the Prison Lift Station. The pump will be cleaned and checked and come with a new 5-year warranty.

Motion by Alderman Dorchinecz and seconded by Alderman Skultety to recommend to the City Council to approve the purchase of a pump for the Prison Lift Station from the Village of Edinburg at a cost of \$8,148.00. Motion carried 4-0.

SUPERINENDENT'S REPORT

Incoming Street and Sewer Superintendent Mike Mann reported the Department has been busy working on the following projects:

- Tree Clean-ups
- Street Repairs
- Ditch and Alley Repairs

Mr. Mann stated he is going to prioritize projects he wants to start with and has discussed these projects with Alderman Olive. Alderman Skultety asked when the Department would be resuming work on the sidewalk replacement program; Mr. Mann advised he would discuss with Alderman Olive on how to proceed.

ANY OTHER MATTERS

Jeff, Jan, Dennis and Kelly Bland were in attendance to discuss a City storm sewer drain that runs across their property located at 1424 Sportsman Drive. The Southeast corner still has old clay tiles; they want to move the storm sewer to make the property more sellable. This issue was not an agenda issue so no action can be taken. This issue will be on next months Street and Sewer Committee Agenda.

Alderman Budd asked that City Clerk Lilly be asked to place on the October 7, 2019 City Council Agenda, the reimbursement of \$89,622.75 back to Ward I from pooled cash from the 2017/2018 MFT refund

Motion by Alderman Dorchinecz and seconded by Alderman Skultety to adjourn. Motion carried 4-0.

Chairman Olive called the meeting to order at 6:00 P.M.

UPDATE OF EAST & WEST MAIN CROSS

Bill Sleeman, Benton & Associates, presented the Committee with a Project Summary for East Main Cross Street Improvement Project Summary which provided the Project Cost Estimate (\$910,500.00, based on a 12-week construction period) and a Preliminary Schedule outlining each step and time frame to proceed. The East Main Cross project will be completed in three sections: South Wyandotte Street to North Cherokee Street, Pawnee Street to South Wyandotte Street and Walnut Street to Pawnee Street. This project will be funded with MFT Funds.

Mr. Sleeman also provided information for the West Main Cross Street Improvements Project which included the Project Cost Estimate (\$991,500.00) and Funding Options. After discussion the Committee agreed on Option 1: City is responsible for 20% the remaining 80% will be using STU Funds. Option 1 requires (QBS) Qualified Base Selection for Construction Engineering.

The Committee asked if Water Superintendent Speagle had been included in these discussions to schedule any water main work that would be needed prior to construction, and asked if the cost of water mains is included. Superintendent Speagle is aware of the projects and has discussed completing all the work at one time. The cost of any water main work is not included in these estimates, but Mr. Sleeman advised there would be no extra cost to bid water mains. Alderman Burtle asked that this project be forwarded to the Water Committee for discussion. Mr. Sleeman advised these costs could be covered by MFT Funds also. The Committee agreed this project needs to get started before the weather gets bad. Mr. Sleeman will send the paperwork to City Clerk Lilly to get the process started upon City Council approval.

Motion by Alderman Driskell and seconded by Alderman Skultety to recommend to the City Council to approve the East Main Cross Project as presented by Benton & Associates, using Local (MFT) Funds with a Project Cost Estimate of \$910,500.00. Motion carried 4-0.

Motion by Alderman Skultety and seconded by Alderman Dorchinecz to recommend to the City Council to proceed with the West Main Cross Project as presented by Benton & Associates using Option 1: Local (MFT) Funds in the amount of \$184,800.00 and Service Transportation Urban (STU) Funds in the amount of \$739,200.00, for a total Project Cost Estimate of \$991,500.00. Motion carried 4-0.

BLAND PROPERTY-SPORTSMAN DRIVE

Dennis, Jeff and Jan Bland were in attendance to discuss a City storm sewer drain that runs across their property located at 1424 Sportsman Drive. They are planning to sell the property, and with the storm drain running across the property, it would prohibit a new construction with basement.

This issue was discussed at last month's meeting. Mayor Barry advised City and County records have been researched on this property. There is no record of the City owning the storm sewer; there are no easements and it is not on the maps.

The Bland family advised they have had title searches done and have researched the property also and they did not find any easements or any information on who installed the storm sewer or ownership. They were asked if he had title insurance. Their father purchased the property in 1970, and had purchased title insurance through Hartzell Givens. They were advised to check into that agreement, and if he had title insurance, it should pay.

At last month's meeting, Jeff Bland stated the City has fixed property in the past due to this storm sewer. Mayor Barry read minutes regarding that incident from a January 24, 2008 Street and Sewer Committee Meeting; the property was on Lawrence Avenue that had issues due to a sink hole. The Street and Sewer Superintendent then was Superintendent Casner who had the line tv'd and the rest of the line was fine. The City fixed this problem. There is no problem with the line, so there is no reason for the City to move it. The City acquired the line through annexation and has to maintain the line, but to move the line would only be a convenience for the property owners. With no ownership of the storm sewer, some did not feel the City should use tax payers money to move it. The line could be a drainage district line and that entity is now defunct.

Dennis Bland stated the City would benefit as well if two new homes were built on the property; it would generate tax money for the City. The City would receive tax dollars, but the base amount Mr. Bland mentioned would have to be divided among all the entities. The City only receives a portion, the County, the Schools etc. all receive a portion. There was discussion regarding the City paying some of the expense as the City did fix the sink hole on Lawrence Avenue. Mr. Bland was advised that was a different Council, different people, different circumstances. Mayor Barry advised it could be very costly to move the storm sewer and an engineer would have to be involved. He was asked to contact City Attorney Romano for legal clarification on how to proceed. This issue will be discussed at the next Street & Sewer Committee Meeting if there is any new information.

STOP SIGN-SHUMWAY & SECOND

Alderman Bryant has received a request from two residents to remove the Stop Sign on Shumway at Second Street. Only one lane of traffic traveling North has to stop, going South do not stop. Some members of the Committee feel Shumway is a thorough way and there should not be a Stop Sign there. The Mayor does not think there has ever been an accident at this location. If the sign is removed, there may be accidents. No action taken; this will be an agenda item next month.

SUPERINENDENT'S REPORT

Street and Sewer Superintendent Mike Mann reported the Department has been busy working on the following projects:

- Tree Clean-ups
- Street Repairs
- Ditch and Alley Repairs
- Limb Pickups

Superintendent Mann advised maintenance was done on the boom mower and two tires were replaced on the sewer truck. There needs to be some repair work on the concrete bins; the east wall needs replaced. Alderman Budd, Chairman of the Finance Committee, recommended that all four wards split the cost, the Aldermen in attendance agreed.

ANY OTHER MATTERS

Josh Assad was in attendance to discuss parking in front of his home and business located at West Vine and North Washington. Illinois Consolidated has built a new building and fenced in the property across the street from his property. There is limited parking; the employees are parking on the street. Since then when there are functions around the square such as the Chilifest, people are parking in front of his property which is preventing him from getting his trucks out of the back of the property. He is requesting No Parking Signs be placed on the

West Side of Washington Street from Poplar Street to Vine Street. The East side is already No Parking. Mr. Assad was informed no action could be taken on this issue at this time, it would need to go to Street & Sewer and the Ordinance Committee, an Ordinance would have to be prepared.

Motion by Alderman Dorchinecz and seconded by Alderman Skultety to adjourn. Motion carried 4-0.
Meeting adjourned at 7:13 P.M.
